# One Village at a Time: One State's Story

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In 2006, Arkansas Children's Hospital initiated a contract, school-based audiology program that became known as the EARS Program (Educational Audiology/Speech Pathology Resources for Schools). At that time, only one public school district in the state of Arkansas employed an educational audiologist to provide onsite, school-based audiology services to schools. Since that time, the use of school-based audiology services has grown every school year.

During the 2010-2011 school year, approximately 52 (out of 239) public school districts in the state of Arkansas used school based audiology on a consistent basis (ranging from once a month to everyday of the school year). Additional school districts contracted at least one visit during the school year for school-based audiology services (n= 21 for 2010-2011 school year).

#### Current Service Delivery Models Used in Arkansas for School-Based Audiology Services

- Audiologist directly employed by school district
- Audiologist directly employed by one school district other districts purchase her time from that district
- Dually certified audiologist employed by school district as an SLP – contracts time above that for audiology services
- Audiology services are contracted from EARS Program @ ACH

The EARS Program @ ACH is an outreach program of the Audiology and Speech Pathology Department. Currently we provide contract, onsite audiology services as well as specialized speech-language pathology consultation for school districts, educational cooperatives, preschool programs and other educational settings.

## School-Based Audiology Services Provided by EARS Program Audiologist may include:

- 1. Technical assistance to teachers and other school personnel 5. Professional development for district personnel on issues regarding amplification (personal and group amplification)
- 2. Hearing aid analysis and troubleshooting onsite
- 3. Assistance in establishing/maintaining an amplification monitoring program
- 4. Attendance at student conferences for referral and programming as needed
- such as classroom acoustics and use/maintenance of amplification
- 6. Hearing evaluations for students who are deaf/hard of hearing and/or for students who have failed hearing screenings
- 7. Screening for and consultation regarding auditory processing disorders

# Specialized Speech-Language Pathology Services Provided by EARS Program SLP may include:

- . Speech and language evaluation and goal writing specialized for students who deaf/hard of hearing
- 2. Modeling of therapy for students who are deaf/hard of hearing especially in the area of auditory skill development
- 3. Technical assistance to speech language pathologist who are seeing students who are deaf/hard of hearing regarding implementation of therapy goals that are specialized for these students
